

Noninvasive test may predict asthma attacks in children

A new technology may help to non-invasively analyse lung sounds in children and infants at risk of an asthma attack.

In a study of 70 severely asthmatic children, the approach was useful for predicting attack symptoms and for identifying asymptomatic children at high risk for an <u>asthma attack</u>.

The results are published in Respirology.
